KINDERGARTEN



STEM CHALLENGES


This year we are incorporating STEM activities into our weekly schedule for all students in grades two through nine. STEM is an acronym that stands for Science, Technology, Engineering, and Mathematics. It's an approach to learning that


integrates these areas and encourages students to develop skills like problem solving, creativity and critical thinking. And, in our case especially, it encourages team work, cooperation and learning from other students, both younger and older than you. We are all smart in different ways, and STEM activities give you a chance to showcase your skills and teach others in your mixed grade group.

Our first STEM task was to build the tallest card tower possible in a given amount of time. All groups were given a standard deck of 52 cards, a carpeted surface to build on and were asked not to bend any cards. In science, we have learned that a triangle is a very stable shape, with a strong base. Students encountered challenges such a curvy card, slippery surfaces, bumping tables, windy talkers and other things that made their towers tumble down. When the bases were built wider and stronger, it was easier to layer the flat cards for the next level. Keeping calm and trying again when the cards spilled was encouraged and each team kept trying in the time given. We were able to build towers that were four, three and two layers tall. Some used more cards than others, but this task was looking for the tallest tower. Great teamwork!

Thanksgiving Fun Facts

- We've celebrated Thanksgiving in Canada for 140 years, starting in November 6, 1879.
- The first Canadian Thanksgiving is said to have traced back to 1578 with explorer Martin Frobisher. He had been trying to find a northern passage to the Pacific Ocean and held his Thanksgiving celebration not for harvest but in thanks for surviving the long journey from England through the perils of storms and icebergs. On his final voyage to the far north, Frobisher held a formal ceremony in Frobisher Bay in Baffin Island (present-day Nunavut) to give thanks to God and in a service ministered by the preacher Robert Wolfall they celebrated Communion.
- Alternatively, some say that the origins of Canadian Thanksgiving are also sometimes traced to the French settlers who came to New France with explorer Samuel de Champlain in the early 17th century, who celebrated their successful harvests.
- The French settlers in the area typically had feasts at the end of the harvest season and continued throughout the winter season, even sharing food with the indigenous peoples of the area.
